.....Studio has favoured its distaff side (and, whisper it quietly, about time too) with two very different all-female plays. A cast of six got to grips with Southern Louisiana drawls, hairspray and curlers in **Steel Magnolias** to be followed by more American accents as our ladies tackled Jane Chambers' ground-breaking **Last Summer at Bluefish Cove**, garnering much praise and fending off the challenge of being upstaged by a stunning set (pictured left), featuring a beachside hideaway, fronted by tons of sand and lapping waves.

We finished with a sold-out production of **The Flint Street Nativity** – a last minute substitute, but a popular one, for It's A

Wonderful Life, for which the rights became unavailable. Many familiar Studio faces – and some new ones – tapped into their inner seven-year-olds, splendidly kitted out as Kings, shepherds and Nasa spacemen.

Studio gets creative

In between, Studio members were encouraged to explore their creative side with the inauguration of a new monthly venture — Creative at Studio Theatre or C@ST. So far, we've had play readings of members' own work from adaptations to original plays and, in September, our Patron Barney Norris (pictured right with the cast) directed a rehearsed reading of Athol Fugard's **The Road to Mecca**. Rehearsals were open to members and the final "performance" to the public. We concluded the first set of sessions with a potted panto performed for members and two short recordings adapted by Rachel Fletcher from Charles Dickens' Sketches by Boz: A Christmas

Like most years, 2023 had its ups and downs from House Full notices to the very sad losses of two much-treasured



members of our theatre community. Just before Christmas, our current Director of Productions David Rhodes passed away after a lengthy illness. He had hoped to see his season through to its conclusion next summer, but it was not to be. Many of you will have seen David (left) in the numerous plays he appeared in for us as actor, singer and musician — most recently as Malvolio in Merely Players, a murderous knight in Murder in The Cathedral, Egeus in The Comedy of Errors and a pantomime pirate in Treasure Island. He approached Shakespeare and panto with the same gusto that he approached life and Studio is the poorer for his loss. In Autumn, Studio also lost its much-loved former President Rosemary Squires, who had

faithfully championed and supported us for nearly 20 years. Ill health had already persuaded her to step back to allow national treasure Christopher Biggins to take her place, but she is remembered with great affection.

Fresh start for Studio Youth Theatre

This month sees the relaunch of Studio Youth Theatre, which has a new leadership team headed up by Antonia Harding as Artistic Director. It will run every Wednesday at Studio between 5.30pm and 8pm for young people in Years 9 to 13. The programme for the first half term will be a mixture of drama games, the basics of theatre, script and character work. Another new venture involved a wrestling ring and more OTT histrionics than you will ever see in a Studio Theatre production as bodies hit the floor and bounced off ropes, then crashed out of the ring and up the aisle to the delight of a sell-out audience ranging in age from eight to 80. Still to come — extended runs of both our in-house productions this Spring:

April 16-20 and 22-26: Love from a Stranger. A tense psychological thriller from Agatha Christie, adapted by Frank Vosper, in which Cecily Harrington seeks "love from a stranger" following a sweepstake win that, in many ways, reflects elements of Christie's own colourful life.

July 5-6 and 8-13: One Man, Two Guvnors. Written by Richard Bean, this was a huge hit for the National Theatre and its leading man, James Corden. Fired from his skiffle band, Francis Henshall is fond of food and money in that order, and finds himself as the servant of two masters in his pursuit of both. Throw in an upper-class twit, a local mobster, a ham actor and a doddery waiter – and mayhem ensues. Please note: there is a matinee at 2pm on July 6.

PLUS We are entering both the Totton Festival or Drama in March and the Woolstore One Act Play Festival in Codford in May with Lesley Bates' stage adaptation of Baroness Orczy's **Lady Molly of Scotland Yard.**

Planning is also underway for a joint venture with Salisbury Museum in June centring on the life and letters of artist Rex Whistler to tie in with a major retrospective at the Museum to mark the 80th anniversary of Whistler's death. Watch this space for more information............
